RAISING TAXES ON TOBACCO: LESSONS FROM THE PHILLIPPINES AND UKRAINE

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Background

- There is an urgent need to better understand the political dynamics that lead to the adoption of tobacco tax policy
- This study explored the process and determinants that led to the successful passage of the 2012
 Sin Tax Reform Law in the Philippines and the 2017 Seven-Year Plan for tobacco tax increase in Ukraine

Methods

- A case study approach was used
- Data were gathered from key informant interviews (n=36) and documents (n=47)
- Cross-case analysis was subsequently employed to identify similarities and difference across the two cases


Results

 The political economy of the Philippines and Ukraine opened a window of opportunity for proponents



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To facilitate the passage of the tobacco tax policy, proponents in the Philippines and Ukraine worked in partnerships, leveraging key political entry points and framing the policy as a public health matter rather than a revenue generating measure.



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Results

- Leveraging key entry points, proponents worked in partnership, involving supporters within the Ministries of Finance and Health
- Proponents framed the policy as a health and revenue generating measure
- Experts trusted by the government used local data to counter industry arguments, address concerns and develop models

Conclusion

Tobacco tax proponents need to:

- 1. Develop a thorough understanding of the country's political economy in order to identify entry points and tailor their messages and tactics effectively
- 2. Work collaboratively, involving proponents from both the Ministries of Health and Finance
- 3. Frame the policy as a win for health and a win for revenue,
- 4. Involve experts trusted by the government
- 5. Use local data to enhance the credibility of the models and arguments

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
